A. **COURSE DESCRIPTION:**

The focus in the course is two-fold: one, to introduce participants to the principles of Universal Design for Learning (UDL) and, two, to engage participants in immediately implementing these principles into their practice by revising their current work using the UDL Guidelines and the UDL Progression Rubric. All aspects of the course will include an emphasis on effectively integrating technology as a means of implementing the practices and structures of UDL.

The course uses a combination of materials (online, printable, multimedia) to help the participants build a shared background and language for each Module. Participants demonstrate understanding of the material by creating various products (i.e., a revised homework assignment or practice, a revised assessment, etc.) and by participating in online discussions in Canvas.

The course is designed to provide participants with an option to engage in professional development in Universal Design for Learning in a flexible, online structure to support the district's goals for providing in-district professional development.

If you plan on matriculating into a graduate program at Fitchburg State University, please be aware that twelve semester hours of Fitchburg State University credit taken within a year prior to the student's admission may be applied to the degree program with the approval of the program chairperson. Anything over 12 credits prior to matriculation will NOT be accepted towards the degree.

A. LEARNING OUTCOMES / OBJECTIVES:

This course will address the Conceptual Framework in the following way(s):

Knowledge: As a result of the learning experiences in the course, you will strengthen your understanding of:

- what UDL is and where you are as an educator in your understanding of UDL (**Discussion #1**)
- education technology tools that support your UDL implementation (**Discussion #2**)
- how hyperdocs can assist teachers in developing meaningful lessons/units (**Project #1**)
- how UDL and education technology can assist teachers in transforming homework (**Project #2**)
- how to universally design preparation for tests/assessments so students can access them successfully (**Project #3**)
- how to collect, respond to, and integrate feedback (**Project #4**)

- how to self-reflect and use the results of that reflection to create a meaningful teacher-designed UDL project (**Project #4**)
- how to effectively share professional learning and growth with colleagues (**Discussion #3**)

Skill: As a result of the learning experiences in the course, teachers will gain confidence in the implementation of the Universal Design for Learning (UDL) framework as a tool to foster student choice, voice and capacity to create better learning opportunities and outcomes for their students.

Caring: As a result of the learning experiences in the course, you will become more competent in your ability to:

- reach all students when instructing using the UDL framework
- reach all students when preparing for assessments using the UDL framework
- reach all students when developing projects using the UDL framework
- reach all students when planning lessons/units using the UDL framework
- gather feedback from students/parents to improve implementation of UDL framework

Ethical: As a result of the learning experiences in the course, participants will better understand how traditional instruction may prevent some students from learning and engaging in the curriculum.

Technology Initiatives:

- a means to inform and improve their teaching practice
- an enhancement tool for the design of lessons and curriculum units
- a way to communicate with instructor, complete assignments & collaborate with peers

D. COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

This course will run from November 5, 2019 until March 30, 2020. This course requires participants to be engaged and prepared for each and every assignment. The course will be a combination of (optional) face-to-face and electronic instruction (i.e., FaceTime) and online engagement. Participants will be expected to pass in work by the due date, but will also be given the opportunity to revise and improve upon their work (just as students in their class should be given the same respect using the UDL framework). Students are expected to perform two hours of work outside of class for every hour spent in class.

Module 0 November 25, 2019 - December 1, 2019; Introductions

Module 1 December 2, 2019 - December 8, 2019; Introduction to Universal Design for Learning (UDL)

- **Discussion #1** - Participants will share out with the group what they have learned about Universal Design for Learning (UDL). They will reflect on their current practice in light of areas of strength in UDL implementation and areas of growth. Responses can be in the form of written reflection, visuals, video or audio or a multimedia presentation.

Module 2 December 9, 2019 - December 15, 2019

- **Discussion #2** - Participants will explore how to use the Tools in the Google Apps for Education Suite (GAPE) to support students in removing and/or overcoming barriers to learning. They will reflect on their current use of various GAPE tools and areas where they can leverage these tools to support students more effectively.

Module 3 December 16, 2019 - January 5, 2020 (includes break for the holidays)

- **Project #1** - Participants will begin by exploring the concept of a hyperdoc and will look at various real-world examples from a local middle school. Participants will create their own hyperdoc that effectively includes resources and materials for the instruction of an entire standard or collection of related standards.

Module 4 January 6, 2020 - January 19, 2020

- **Project #2** - Participants will evaluate the type of homework regularly assigned to students and design some examples of alternatives as they work to bring choice to homework to increase student engagement. Participants will create an authentic document for student use in their classroom.

Module 5 January 21, 2020 - February 3, 2020

- **Project #3** - Teachers will transform a traditional assessment, or design one from scratch, and apply the principles of UDL so more students can succeed and incorporate critical habits of mind.

Module 6 February 4, 2020 - February 23, 2020 (includes one week break for vacation)

- **Project #4** - Participants will reflect on their understanding of how students and/or parents can both inform and improve their teaching practice. They will either:
 - Create a survey tool where they ask students to provide mastery-oriented feedback to teachers on curriculum, instruction, classroom environment or level of engagement. Reflect on the possible results and consider how those results will improve their teaching practice.
 - Create a resource that they can share with students that helps them build a growth mindset as students consider what they could do differently to improve their approach or preparation for the course.
 - Design a lesson where they teach students how to provide them with feedback.

- Develop a system for students' parents to express their feedback about curriculum, instruction, homework, etc.

Module 7 February 24, 2020 - March 9, 2020

- **Project #5** - Participants design their own projects for this assignment. Recommended projects include going deeper into a topic from one of the two Discussions in the course and developing that into a project for student use OR creating a new version of one of the Projects but with new content (i.e., a second hyperdoc or second assessment, etc.) OR proposing a totally new topic.

Module 8 March 10, 2020 - March 30, 2020 (final work due to instructor, including any revisions and incomplete work)

- **Discussion #3** - Participants will reflect on their work in this course as a whole and will choose one assignment from the course to share with colleagues in the district.

Final wrap up (72 hours after end of course)
